INTRODUCTION

This book is dedicated to the descendants of LEONARD PILOTE and of his wife DENISE GAU(L)TIER.

I cannot remember when my interest in genealogy began. However, I believe that it dates back to the memory of my maternal great-grandfather and grandfather and of my paternal grandmother.

I have lived my childhood during the era of oral tradition, on the threshold of the present day audio-visual era. My maternal great-grandfather and grandfather, as well as my paternal grandmother, all nonagerarians at their deaths, left me an oral heritage that no book can retain. The story of their struggles, of their joys and their pains, told as they lived them, is the history of their lives as they lived them in the 19th Century.

My great-grandfather, when he died at 97 years of age, had kept his keen spirit, an open mind on his entourage and a "historical" memory dating back to the Union of the Upper and Lower Canadas. He often spoke of his life as a child and as a youth in Québec City, and of his travels that took him to Chicago by way of Bytown(Ottawa) and York(Toronto).

However, the person who impressed me the most with his stories, or history of his life, was my maternal grandfather. For me he was the greatest story-teller that ever lived. He could sustain my attention and satisfy my eagerness to learn and send my imagination soaring. I remember the long summer evenings when at dusk I would slip onto his lap and candidly ask him: "Tell me a story". stories he could tell or was it his history? He would lay down his pipe and with humour and creativity he would start endless vivid narratives, sometimes real, sometimes imagined - depending on the effect they created upon my grandmother who would half-listened while her knitting needles clicked on. Sometimes a sly smile would purse his lips, or a tear would appear behind his glasses. would pause for a moment - I would remain silent - then continue his story. At times, sleep seemed to gain on me, but very often, his long harangues would overexcite my imagination, not producing my mother's expectations at bedtime.

On the other hand, my paternal grandmother, who died at ninety, left us a rich heritage of documents, some dating back to 1845 and an impressive collection of old photographs, each containing a piece of history that she willingly, but not without emotion, recalled. As I looked through these documents and the old photographs, I was able to somewhat evoke her past - "herstory".

My purpose in presenting this work is twofold. On a personal level I wish to relate the stories of our ancestors. In a broader context, it stands as a record of the life and times of many who

lived in centuries past.

It is not a story of battles that were won and fought but a document that will reveal how men, women and children lived centuries ago.





OUR ANCESTOR LEONARD PILOTE

Known genealogical data leads us to believe that Léonard Pilote is the common ancestor to all North American Pilotes. Presently, we do not know his precise date and place of birth, nor do we know his parents' names.

However, based on available parish records, we know that Léonard was born in 1619 because he was forty years of age on the day of his baptism at Québec in 1659. We also know that when he married Denise Gauthier on May 16, 1644 (Rene Jetté mentions 1654) in the Church of Ste-Marguerite at La Rochelle, France, the records show that he was from St-Nicollas, a small village in the diocese of La Rochelle, Charente-Maritime. The witnesses at the ceremony were Nicollas Mabillon, René Ray, François Bazouin and Louis Foucquerai.

Léonard Pilote and Denise Gauthier had three children, two of them born in France. They were: Marguerite, born on June 4, 1653 and baptized two days later in the Church of St-Sauveur of La Rochelle; Jean was baptized on September 16, 1657 by l'abbé Fourré of La Rochelle, his godparents were Jean Barraguay, merchant, and Magdeleine Petit. The youngest, Pierre, was born and was baptized on March 4, 1663 in Québec city.

During the summer of 1657, Léonard sailed for New France from La Rochelle, leaving his pregnant wife of seven months and his eldest the four-year old Marguerite. How could Léonard justify his decision to leave without his family? Was he a merchant in quest of a better enterprise? Was he sent by the King of France? Was he a Huguenot anxious to leave France?

A close look at the relationship between France and its colony in New France, the living conditions of the times, the ocean voyages, the type of contract that immigrants had to sign helps to understand Leonard's decision to leave France.

The Contract

Fifty years after the founding of Québec in 1608 by Samuel de Champlain, the population of New France was under 3,000. It was made up of a handful of nobles, forming a small aristocratic administration, a few "bourgeois" merchants or traders, adventurers or "coureurs des bois" engaged in the lucrative fur trade, some missionaries and their aides, and a few hundred farmers regrouped, for the most part, near the shores of the St-Lawrence River, namely

Stadaconé (Québec City), Trois-Rivières and Hochelaga (Montreal). The population of New France, although very diversified, had grown slowly. Acadia (The Maritime provinces) was in the hands of the British. In New England the population made up mostly of Dutch and British immigrants had grown rapidly and presented a threat to the small population to the North.

The native peoples felt threatened from both sides and constantly attacked the French colony. The uneasiness was enhanced further by some bickering that existed among the religious communities and by their political interference in the affairs of the Quebec Administrative Council. All these factors hindered the effective operation of the affairs of the Colony. The Governor Lauzon was recalled to France in 1656. His son Charles Lauzon-Charny succeeded him but returned to France two years later in 1658.

The King of France, Louis X1V, realized that the only efficient way to protect his interests in the Colony, was to assign stable settlers and colonists. Aware of the King's willingness to accelerate the demographic growth by immigration, a number of rich merchants began to hire new recruits in the Ports of France. At La Rochelle, as in other Ports of France, many inhabitants influenced by the King's ambition and by the tales of the travelers returning from New France, were easily persuaded.

A person wishing to immigrate signed a contract of engagement. They were called the "36-mois" (thirty-six months), that is to say the contract was for a period of three years. The advantage of the system of hiring was to supply labourers to aggressive merchants and to bring to the newcomers a period of adjustment and training for a lifestyle that they could choose or reject. If both parties were satisfied, the immigrants could hope to obtain a tract of land where they could settle.

The merchants, on the other hand, had to assume the cost of the return trip, food for the duration of the contract, plus a sum of from 50 to 100 livres depending on the terms of the contract and on the trade of the contractees. They were wheelwrights, coopers, carpenters, tailors, merchants, etc. In other words, all the tradesmen necessary to build a country!

The Sea Voyage

In the seventeenth Century, when our ancestor Léonard Pilote arrived in New France, the immigrants crossed the Atlantic Ocean at their own risks and perils on board unstabled ships, often ill-adapted or ill-equipped for their passengers as well as for their cargos. At the time some mercenary merchants, with little or no consideration for the comfort, hygiene and quality of food, carried barrels of food and clothing, tools and furniture, passengers and

crews in the holds of ships. A few privileged passengers could expect better treatment.

The crossing could take from six to twelve weeks creating displeasure and irritation among the passengers, lack of fresh water and of perishable food. These lamentable conditions often gave rise to revolts and mutinies among the passengers and crews. Added to this, were the epidemics that affected the crews as well as the passengers.

Upon their arrival, the immigrants had to face a lifestyle for which they were ill-prepared. The forest had to be cleared of trees that had to be hewn for the construction of a shelter. They had to hunt for their food and cultivate the virgin soil. Other elements, more insidious, had to be conquered: the unknown, the isolation, the uncertainly, the cold, fear and hunger.

LEONARD PILOTE IN NEW FRANCE

Léonard had signed a contract of engagement before his departure, perhaps many months before leaving France. During the summer of 1657, five ships arrived in the port of Quebec. Léonard Pilote was among the passengers on the ship "LE TAUREAU, that arrived in the Port of Québec, under the command of Captain Tadourneau, on June 21 1657.

Was Léonard Pilote among the privileged few aboard the ship that brought him to New France? Was he merchant or cooper? Many documents, signed by Léonard, revealed a man of imposing stature, energetic, friendly. The positions that he occupied proved that he was educated, well-mannered and that he had every intention of succeeding in business and of settling in New France as evidenced by his activities soon after his arrival.

In his book <u>Une Poignée de Tremblay</u>, Laurent Tremblay tells us that when his ancestor Pierre Tremblay signed his contract of bethrothal with the "Fille du Roy" Ozanne Achon, on September 9, 1657, he invited all his friends to sign "...the fiancée was surrounded by Pierre Massé and his wife Marie Piver, Léonard Pilot... all merchants of Lower Town Québec". Moreover, when speaking of Ozanne Achon Laurent Tremblay mentions that upon her arrival "... many people knew her, because upon her arrival in Canada she met old friends of the family." Therefore, we can assuume that only two months after his arrival in Québec, our ancestor Léonard, was established as a merchant and already had a circle of friends. Was Ozanne related to Léonard? Were Ozanne's parents former friends of Léonard? Had Léonard and Ozanne crossed the Atlantic on the same ship?

.As mentioned above Ozanne Achon (a descendant of the Moors

according to some researchers) was a "Fille du Roy", that is she was a protégé of the Queen Mother of France, Anne of Austria and patron of the female immigration. Orphans of government employees or soldiers who died in battle and raised by the King, peasant girls recruited by their parish pastor, history tells us that all of these young girls were without reproach. Many of them were adolescents and had to accept marriage upon their arrival because, as some historians tell us, to build a people one must fill the cradles and this generous task belongs to women! Generous task indeed, but not always gratifying, however necessary to build a country. The History of New France was made thus.

The King provided these young girls with a dowry of fifty livres and the cost of the voyage. It is worthy of note that these young girls were sometimes recruited in Spain and Portugal as well as in France.

Our ancestor Léonard Pilote proved to be a good businessman. Soon after his arrival, on October 7, 1958, at the request of the Merchant Michel Desorcy — also called Sire of Boutantrain — accompanied by two witnesses, Julien Martin and Benjamin Auzeau, before the Notary Guillaume Adouart, Leonard signed a document appointing him Mr. Desorcy's Procurator during the latter's absence. Leonard was vested the power to manage the affairs of Mr. Desorcy and, therefore, became the emissary of His Majesty the King of France! Documents reveal that Mr. Desourcy made a voyage to La Rochelle on June 27, 1659. Thus, Léonard had acquired some prestige and the respect of his contemporaries, and also had earned the trust of the Administration.

On March 26, 1659, less than two years after his arrival and one year before his "36-month" contract had expired, Mr. Simon Denys, Sieur de la Trinité, husband of Françoise du Tertre, granted him a tract of land of two "arpents wide by thirty arpents deep along the line of the Seigneurie Notre-Dame-des-Anges ... from the wooded area to the great St-Lawrence River." This tract of land was a part of the seven "arpents deep", that Mr. Denys had purchased from the Jesuits.

The notarized deed prepared by the notary Jean-Baptiste Peuvret and witnessed by René Maheu and Claude Charron, stipulated that Léonard Pilote must pay the Jesuits, every year, the sum of eight livres, fifteen sols and capons for the seigneural rights and privileges. Léonard was bound also to maintain the property and to build his house. A note on the notarized document added that the signee must also supply a cord of wood to the farm of the mortgager during the whole period of the lease and that the mortgagee must help the Sieur Denys to maintain the roads, fences, etc. of the property.

In the summer 1659, Léonard had written to his wife, begging her to come and join him in New France. The following year, in the summer of 1660, Léonard signed a two-year lease with M. Denis de la Ronde

for a house on the street Sous-le-fort, near the Cap Diamant in Québec City. Truly, Denise Gauthier and her children Marguerite and Jean had come to New France to rejoin Léonard. (See map). Why did Léonard decide to lease a house instead of moving his family in the house that he had promised to build on the tract of land granted to him the year before. Had Léonard fail to meet his engagement to build a house? Did his business deals require him to remain in the house on the street Sous-le-fort? So many questions deserve our attention.

Then on August 9, 1662, Etiennette Desprès, widow of the Governor of Trois-Rivières dead at the hands of the Iroquois, solicited Léonard to settled on a vast farm of 69 "arpents" with barn and stable, that she owned near the Beauport River. Léonard accepted this offer and moved to this farm with his family. This is where their youngest son Pierre was born on March 8, 1663. Pierre was baptized by Father Lauzon-Charny at Beauport under the name of his godfather Pierre Denys who, we know, was the benefactor of the Pilote family. The godmother was none other that Marie-Anne Duplessis, no doubt the daughter of Léonard's benefactor, Etiennette Desprès-Duplessis.

Léonard's circle of friends had increased, his assets accrued and his renown gained momentum. On December 22, 1664, Léonard was a witness at the marriage of Charles Garnier to Louise Vézina, daughter of Jacques Vézina and Marie Boisdon - names to be retained for the descendants of Jean Pilote, son of Léonard.

Again, on October 15, 1665, Léonard received a new concession of land from Dr. Jean Madry. This was to be the last concession that Léonard received as barely two months later, Léonard died at Québec where he was buried on December 3, 1665. He was in his early forties and we can only assume that died after a short illness. A clue is provided in the Annals of Sainte-Anne-de-Beaupré for that year. It was then reported that he had miraculously been cured of an "eye infection". Was the eye infection an exterior sign of a grave illness? It is quite possible, even probable.

Merchant, procurator, builder of a nation, family man, Léonard played an important rôle in the early history of New France. We own him and Denise a note of gratitude.

MARGUERITE PILOTE

Marguerite Pilote was the eldest of Léonard Pilote and of Denise Gauthier. Born in France, she arrived in Canada with her parents and her brother Jean in 1660. She was about four years old then. Her younger brother Pierre was born, as we know, on March 4, 1663 in Québec.

When her father Léonard died in December 1665, he was in the employ of the widow Etiennette Desprès and we can assume that, for a time, her mother Denise Gauthier remained at the service of the said lady On December 27, 1666, by a notarized act, her mother Denise assigned Jean Drouard, a domestic with the Jesuits, as guardian to her and her brothers Jean and Pierre. Thus, Jean Drouard was entrusted with the administration Léonard's inheritance to his three children. It is probable, but not proven, that Jean Drouard continued to manage the children's inheritance until the marriage of their mother to Robert Lefebvre, as revealed At that time they were living with their in the 1667 census. mother and their stepfather Robert Lefebvre.

Four years later, on January 20, 1671, Marguerite Pilote married her former guardian Jean Drouard in Québec. She was not yet sixteen years of age. The couple had two children: Robert Drouard born on April 1672 at Beauport and Marie-Madeleine Drouard, born on January 29, 1675.

THE CHILDREN OF

MARGUERITE PILOTE AND OF JEAN DROUARD

Robert (Pilote) Drouard

The 1681 Census revealed that Robert (Pilote) Drouard, aged nine, was a domestic at the Jesuit Seminary. It is not known how long he remained in the service of the Jesuits, but on May 9, 1707, when he married Marie-Madeleine Pagé, daughter of Guillaume Pagé and of Elizabeth LeTartre, he was a Quebec merchant. This marriage was of short duration as Marie-Madeleine Pagé died on February 10, 1708, just nine days after the birth of her son Michel Drouard. Her husband Robert Drouard died on February 16, 1717, at the age of 55, leaving his only heir, Michel Drouard, who was then nine years old.

The orphan Michel Drouard is left alone. Did he find refuge with his grandmother Marguerite Pilote? Did he, as his father before him, become a domestic at the Jesuit Seminary? Very little is known of him. However, we know that he was a bourgeois in Québec when he married Marie-Catherine Rouer de Villeray, daughter of Augustin Rouer de Villeray and of Louise LeGardeur, on November 1726 at Québec. The couple had three children: Michel Jean-Baptiste born on September 22, 1727; Louise-Catherine on February 10, 1729 and Marie-Anne on April 12, 1730, all born in Quebec City. Marie-Anne died six days after her birth and was buried in Lauzon.

Michel Drouard, only heir of Robert Drouard and of Marie-Madeleine Pagé, great-grandson of Léonard Pilote, is also the only heir of his grandmother Marguerite Pilote. Michel's only descendants are his son Michel Jean-Baptiste and his daughter Louise-Catherine Drouard.

Marie-Madeleine (Pilote) Drouard

Marie-Madeleine (Pilote) Drouard, born on January 29, 1675, entered the Ursuline Convent in Québec on April 25, 1699 where she pronounced her vows three years later on February 2, 1702. She took the name of Mère Saint-Michel. At the recommendation of her superiors and of her bishop, Monsignor de St-Valier, she served her community at Trois-Rivières. She died at age 82 after a long period of 67 years of service to her community.

Michel (Pagé) Drouard

Michel (Pagé) Drouard, the only child of Robert (Pilote) Drouard and Marie-Madeleine Pagé, was orphaned at the age of nine, following the death of his mother at his birth and of his father in 1717. What happened to him then? Did he find refuge with his maternal grandmother Marguerite Pilote (daughter of Léonard)? Like his father Robert Douard and his grandfather Jean Drouard, did he serve the Jesuits? Did they later become his tutors? It is probable. We know that nine years later, when he was eighteen, Michel married Marie-Catherine Rouer de Villery, daughter of Augustin Rouer de Villeray and Louise Gardeur, on November 10, 1726 at Québec, he was a bourgeois of Québec.

Michel (Pagé) Drouard and Marie-Madeleine Pagé had three children: Michel Jean Baptiste (Rouer) Drouard on September 22, 1727; Louise-Catherine (Rouer) Drouard on February 10, 1729 and Marie-Anne (Rouer) Drouard on April 12, 1730, - all born at Québec. Marie-Anne died and was buried seven days after her birth on April 20, 1730 at Lauzon.

Michel (Pagé) Drouard, only child of Robert Drouard and Marie-Madeleine Pagé, great grandson of Léonard Pilote, was Marguerite (Pilote) Drouard's only heir - an inheritance that was passed on to Michel Jean-Baptiste and his sister Louise-Catherine Drouard.

JEAN PILOTE

Jean Pilote, first-born of Léonard and Denise Gau(1)tier, was eight years old when his father Léonard died in December 1665. The following year, in an notarized document, his mother assigned a guardian, Jean Drouard, to administer the inheritance left by his father, an inheritance that he shared with his sister and brother. His mother Denise Gau(1)tier remarried in February 1667 to Robert Lefebvre who, we have seen, promised to provide for the three orphans.

When did Jean leave his guardian's home? When his mother remarried he was ten years old, almost a man for a person of his times. Did he become a domestic of the Jesuits like his guardian Jean Drouard? It is possible and probable. The many documents I have consulted in the Québec Archives revealed a great deal on the life on Jean Pilote.

Firstly, we know that his marriage to Marie Françoise Gaudry was celebrated on June 27, 1678 in Québec City. He was 21 years of age. Three years later, the Québec 1681 census revealed that he had eight arpents of tilled land, a cow and a gun.

Ten months after their marriage, Françoise gave birth to their first-born, Marie-Agnès, who was baptized at L'Ancienne-Lorette. Their first son was born and baptized on September 13,1681 at Lauzon - a village across the river from Quebec City. Marguerite was also born and baptized at Lauzon. There is no exact record of their fourth child, Pierre, who was born circa 1686.* André was born on the 12th of July and was baptized two days later at Sillery. Marie-Françoise was born at Lauzon on July 6th and was baptized on the 9th at Neuville. Ignace was born circa 1690 at St-Nicolas. No mention is made of the birthplace of their eighth and ninth children, Madeleine and Louise-Charlotte, born circa 1692 and 1694 respectively. Jeanne-Françoise was born on the 15th of November 15, 1696 and was baptized on December 8, 1696 of the same The last four siblings, Joseph, Marie-Anne and the twin Charles and Jacques were all born and baptized at St-Nicolas. these offsprings, two died at an early age; Madeleine became Mother Saint-Ursule of the Ursulines Community of nuns. Marie-Françoise and Ignace died at 6 and 9 respectively. There were no children born between the years 1684 and 1688. It is difficult to understand the births of these numerous children, in different localities. Was Jean a merchant displacing his family as he moved to fulfil the obligations of his contracts?

There is another possible explanation for these births in different cities. At the time, missionairies visited the homes for the purpose of baptizing the children born after their last visits, sometimes semi-annually, delaying their registration of baptisms until they reached the nearest parish, not necessarily the parent's parish, or whenever time permitted. (René Jetté Genealogical Dictionnary of the Quebec Families contains certain inconsistencies — sometimes only the date of birth appears, other times only the baptism date, other times both). Based on the above statement, one could conclude that the missionaries visited Jean's home, baptized his children delaying their registration to a later date in any of the parishes under their jurisdiction.

Secondly, although Jean seemed to have travelled a great deal, two maps of Québec City for that period clearly indicate the presence of a "Pilotte". The 1685 Québec City Map (Plan cadastral de 1685) designated a lot in Sillery as the "Pilotte" lot. Later, in 1709, the Sieur de Catalogne, acting under the orders of the King of France, drew a map of Québec City. Both maps refer to the same lot as the "Pilotte" lot.

Finally, the series of contracts consulted reveal not only his activities and whereabouts during his lengthy career, but the traits of his personality, In 1683, after signing a contract with Aubert de la Chesnaye, and accompanied by Eustache Prévost, Martin Foisy, Laurent Benoit, dit Livernois, and others, he left on a fur trade expedition in Illinois for Mr. de la Durantye and Le Chevalier de Baugy. Upon their return, mission accomplished, these coureurs des bois were ambushed and made prisonners of the Iroquois who then confiscated their seven canoes and their contents of furs and provisions. The Iroquois escorted them to Fort St-Louis where they were released. They were left with only a rifle and a little powder. Did our coureurs des bois negotiate for the rifle and the ammunition? In the dense forest rifle and ammunition are synonomus with survival. Was it an act of humanity on the part of their aggressors who, better than anyone, knew that these were necessary for their survival? It is possible, even probable. One thing is certain, they were intrepid adventurers and did not lack courage as is evidenced by their return to Quebec City nine days later.

Another contract, also notarized and dated April 30, 1685, only two years after his near fatal expedition, proved that Jean did not give up his dangerous trade for a more gentile occupation. In fact, Jean embarked on numerous dangerous expeditions throughout his long life and his career as a "coureur des bois" and settler.


It is worthy of note that in his book on the Pilote Family, Georges-Renaud Pilote points out that subsequent to an investigation into Pierre Pilote's "values, competence and fidelity to his Catholic religion, the Intendant granted the said Pierre the commission of Bailiff to the Sovereign Council on May 12, 1632". At that time Pierre (30) and his wife of a few months, Louise Chalifou (25) lived in a house on the rue Sous-le-fort. At that in Lower Town Québec, as recorded in the 1716 Census for the City Québec, as ordered by the Bishop of that city. Pierre Pilote, of course, was the son of Jean Pilote and grandson of Léonard. Pierre, therefore, lived in a house on the street where his grandfatheer had taken residence in New France when his family had joined him. Pierre seemed to have inherited the latter's leadership qualities and stature.


Jean Pilote, the ancestor of all the Pilotes of America, intrepid coureur des bois, adventurer, father of a large family ended his days in Québec City. He was octogenarian at his death and left his inheritance to his sons Jean, Pierre and the last-born, the twins Jacques and Charles. The Pilotes of Toronto are all descendants of Charles Pilote.



PIERRE PILOTE

Pierre is the last born of Léonard Pilote and Denise Gau(1)tier - their only child born in New France.

Pierre, as we have seen, was assigned a guardian, Jean Drouard, by his mother upon the death of his father Léonard when he was about two years old. We believe, that Jean Drouard remained his guardian until the second marriage of his mother Denise Gauthier to Robert Lefebyre.

Pierre was thirty years old and a domestic for the Jesuits at the time of his marriage to Marie-Jeanne Brassard, daughter of Jean-Baptiste Brassard and Jeanne Quelvé on January 11, 1694 at Québec. Only child born of their marriage was Marguerite, who was named after her aunt of the same name (Léonard's daughter) on November 7, 1794, the day after her birth.

Marguerite Pilote (not to be confused with her aunt) married Joseph Racine, son of Pierre Racine and Louise Guyon, on February 20,. 1715 at Beaupré. Marguerite and Pierre had eight children. Marguerite died two days following the birth of her last child, Charles, who had died the day before.

The descendants of Pierre Pilote, youngest son of Léonard Pilote and Denise Gauthier, can be traced today through the patronym of Racine dit Beauchesne.

DENISE GAU(L)TIER

Denise Gaut(1)ier's baptismal record does not appear in the registry. However, we do know that, like her spouse Léonard Pilote, she was a native of La Rochelle, a seaport in the region of Charente-Maritime. It is most probable that Sainte-Marguerite was her parish Church as it was customary for the bride to marry in her own parish. She was twenty years of age.

Too often, genealogical research is based on the paternal lineage and very little time is spent researching the maternal ascendance. As a Seventeenth Century wife, Denise Gauthier, is no exception. Like many of her contemporaries, of that era, she shared with her husband Léonard all the upsets and travels, joys and pains, fortunes and misfortunes. Moreover, she was separated from her husband for three years before she rejoined him in New France. In fact, at the birth of their first son, Jean, Léonard had already left for New France and when their daughter Marguerite was only four years old.

Upon arriving in Canada during the summer of 1660, she settled in a small rudimentary house on rue Sous-le-fort in lower town Quebec. Denise was faced with a new way of life in a hostile and untamed frontier. One can only speculate the magnitude of the strangeness of the new surroundings and the degree of culture shock. The following year, in 1661, the family moved to a farm owned by Mrs Desprès-Duplessis where her son Pierre was born on March 4, 1663. In less than two years she experienced two moves and the birth of a third child. Immediately following these major events she was widowed in 1665, leaving her alone to fend for herself and to provide for her family of three children whose youngest was only two years old.

Soon after Léonard's death, Denise took over the affairs of the household. On December 27th of the following year, Denise appointed the notary Paul Vachon to prepare an inventory of the assets, valued at 825 livres, bequeathed by Léonard to her children. At about the same time, in a notarized act witnessed by David Courbin and Pierre Parent, Denise appointed Jean Drouard as guardian to her three children in the event that she should predecease her children before their age of majority.

On February 7, 1667, Denise married Robert Lefebvre, son of Olivier

Lefebvre and Michelle Renoust. They had no children. In December of the same year, Denise signed a new contract in favour or her new spouse, naming him her legitimate heir for the sum of 400 livres, a sum that would be passed on to her children at the death of Robert Lefebvre.

For his part, Robert Lefbvre seemed to live comfortably. He owned 20 arpents of tilled land in Beauport, five animals and had the services of the hired hand Thomas Girard. It was here that Robert brought his new family, Denise and her three children, Marguerite, Jean and Pierre as confirmed in the 1667 census. It has also been said (no date mentioned) that Robert Lefebvre was a domestic for the Jesuits and that he and his wife had forfeited their assets in favour of the Jesuits in return for their livelihood, * sometime after their marriage. Denise remained at the service of the Jesuits until her death in 1695. Robert Lefbvre died during the 1703 smallpox epidemic - a contagious disease that affected a large number of the families in New France. Marie de l'Incarnation in her diary in 1790, spoke of it as the "scurge ... the distressing smallpox ... that devastated New France".**

The life and the future of the children of our ancestor Léonard depended on the influence and the devotion of their mother Denise Gaul(t)tier and on the solidarity of their adoptive father Robert Lefebvre. To them we owe a great deal of our gratitude.

*Marie de l'Incarnation, beatified in 1980, was widowed before entering the Ursuline Convent in France. She came to Canada in the Seventeenth Century to teach young girls of the new colonists and of the native peoples. Her letters to her Superiors in France and to her son have been preserved in Canada and are a precious source of information on life as it was in the seventeenth Century.

** This "custom" was not unusual in New France, in fact, it was quite common and was still practiced, to a lesser degree, in the twentieth Century.

JACQUES VÉZINA (1611-1687)

The ancestors of Philomène Vézina, wife of Isaïe Pilote, were Jacques Vézina and Marie Boisdon. Marie gave birth to eight children: five left their descendants, two died in infancy and the youngest left no trace in Canada. Fortunately for us, we can somewhat retrace their steps in Canada through old notarized documents, firstly to the Côte-de-Beaupré (on the St-Lawrence River, near Québec City), then to Neuville and finally to Toronto.

Jacques Vézina came from Puyravault, of the Rochefort sector of the city of La Rochelle. On June 10, 1640, he and his fiancée Marie Boisdon, daughter of Jean Boisdon and Marie Bardin, signed their marriage contract prepared by the Notary Trenot. They were married that same year at St-Rogatien Church, Marie's parish Church.

At the time of his marriage Jacques was a master cooper and we know that by 1655 he was a merchant. He was no doubt both a cooper and a merchant as one could very well manufacture barrels and market them. It is important to note that in the Seventeenth Century, the consumable and fragile goods were shipped in wooden barrels. It follows that a seaport such as La Rochelle would entice both coopers and merchants to engage in their lucrative occupations.

Master cooper, merchant, living in a seaport city, Jacques would be in constant contact with the ships suppliers. La Rochelle of the Seventeenth Century was France's busiest seaport. A Huguenot stronghold, La Rochelle also had an important number of refugies from the religious wars anxious to escape the uneasiness that still permeated their lives in spite of the "Edit de Nantes", signed in 1593, that, as we know, guaranteed them freedom of worship, but at the same time declared the Catholic religion the state religion.

These citizens were often in contact with returning travellers from New France and were sometimes influenced by the tales of "liberty" in a country that could offer them a better way of life. This was also an era when the merchants (often called "petits bourgeois") and the King of France encouraged merchants and workers to settle in New France. Did all these factors influence Jacques? Did he foresee an increase in profits? Was he running away from a political situation that he could not tolerate?

Jacques Vézina's trade was much in demand in New France and, no doubt, a very lucrative one. In the summer of 1659, he sailed from La Rochelle, leaving his wife and family (with the exception of his

eldest François) who would follow him later. (Some historians insist that he came to New France with his family.)

Jacques was part of a large group of immigrants to New France. It is interesting to note the presence of Monesigneur François de Montmorency de Laval, first bishop of New France, on board one of the ships arriving in Québec on June 16, 1659. Appointed by the King of France, the Bishop came to administer not only the affairs of the Church of Rome, but also became the landowner of "La Seigneurie de Beaupré", near Québec City, when he purchased all its shares from the eight associates of the Company de Beaupré. (Seigneuries were large tracts of land assigned to landlords (seigneurs) and based on France's old feudal system.)

Soon after his arrival, Jacques began transactions to settle in his new country of adoption. In fact, six months later, on January 16, 1660, he bought from Jean Juchereau and his associate Louis Garault, three "arpents" of land of the "fief" (landhold) at Charleville, (land that had been ceded to Jean-Baptiste Halle on November 30, 1657, then to Jean Juchereau), for the sum of 120 livres. The piece of land known as Lot No. 9 at L'Ange-Gardien, just east of the Montmorency Falls near Québec City.

Six years later, on January 1666, his eldest son François (now called the elder) purchased a four-arpent tract of land in width on the shores of the St-Lawrence River from Denis Guion, for the sum of 425 livres. François also agreed to pay an annual rent of 6 livres, 6 sols and 2 capons* that Denis Guion owed to the former owner Louis Carreau. This is Lot No. 2 à l'Ange-Gardien. Father and son now lived at close proximity on land bordering on the St-Lawrence River.

^{*} In Seventeenth Century New France purchases were seldom made in currency, but were made in kind, i.e. a cord of wood, a cow, a capon. Consequently, the value of the bride's dowry was sometimes based on the value of the goods, such as linens, animals or holdings that she brought to the marriage.

FRANÇOIS, THE ELDER

On September 26, 1670, François, the elder, and his fiancée, the "Fille du Roy", Jeanne Marié, daughter of Denis Marié and Madeleine Bienvenu, signed their marriage contract at Chateau-Richer (near the Montmorency Falls). (A marriage contract signed between Marie and Laurent Gignart had previously been revoked.) Jeanne had a dowry of 350 livres; and the added King's dowry of 50 livres.

This marriage was of short duration. Jeanne died in childbirth on April 28, 1684, leaving five orphans: François 11, who would inherit the paternal farm, Jacques, François called Pierre, Marie-Agnès and Nicolas. Her husband, François (called the Elder) died eight years later during and epidemic.

Following these prematured deaths, the land of François and Jeanne, known as Lot No. 2, underwent numerous changes. It would be divided among François' heirs and again divided and subdivided during two centuries. However, it remained the inheritaance of generations of Vezinas until 1979 when Cécile Vézina sold what remained of the original Lot No. 2 to the Établissements Notre-Dame or Corporation Notre-Dame.

FRANCOIS, THE YOUNGER

On January 31,1679, François, the Younger, son of Jacques Vézina and Marie Boisdon, signed his marriage contract with Marie Clément, daughter of Jean Clément and Magdeleine Serget (Land No. 7 at L'Ange-Gardien) before the Notary Vachon. The marriage took place on April 10, 1679. The contract contained the following clause: "In consideration of this marriage Jacques Vézinat and Marie Boisdon will give to their son all their assets, furniture and real estate, in exchange for their care for the rest of their lives and pay, after their deaths, 160 livres to his brother François, the Elder, and to each of his sisters: Louise, wife of Charles Garnier (Lot No. 16); Anne, wife of René Brisson; and Marie, wife of Antoine Ossant, including 100 livres to be paid to each on their marriage on the condition that the above mentioned cede to François Vézina, the Younger, all their rights in the future successions of Jacques Vézina and Marie Boisdon."

François, the Younger, and Marie Clément had 12 children between the years 1681 and 1702. As we know François Sr. had died shortly after the birth of his youngest son Jacques and of the marriage of his Eldest son, François, during the 1703 epidemic. François, the Younger, then had 84 arpents of land, a 34 ft by 16 ft house with two bedrooms on one floor, two chimneys, a cellar and an attic.

François, the Younger, and Marie certainly had not expected such premature deaths, but Marie had a strong business sense and a firm desire to provide for her children, as is evidenced by the series of transactions, purchases and land partitions, donations and exchanges that would alter the size and shape of her real estate holdings while insuring the survival of her family on the land inherited from her husband François, the Younger. At her death on November 12, 1723, her son Jacques Vézina and his wife Anne Brisson inherited the Lot No. 9, as stipulated in a notarized act.

It would be difficult to enumerate or described justly all the modifications of the Lot No. 9 over the centuries. Nevertheless, it is right and just to say that when Azarias Vézina sold his land to Joseph-Edouard Laberge on June 10, 1934, for the sum of \$8,200, he was the tenth Vezina generation, from father to son, to live on that piece of land. On May 31, 1944, Robert Laberge inherited the land from his father Joseph-Edouard Laberge. A plaque has been erected to the Vézinas memory on Lot No. 9 at L'Ange-Gardien.

CHAPTER 7

CHARLES VEZINA AT NEUVILLE

On July 7, 1711, the religious nuns of Hôtel-Dieu of Québec ceded to Charles Vézina a lot on the "Seigneurie de Neuville", in the Parish of St-François-de-Sales, consisting of three "arpents" frontage by four "arpents" deep for an annual lease of 75 "livres".

Why did Charles Vézina decide to settle at Neuville, rather than L'Ange-Gardien? There are a few possible explanations for this move. Firstly, most of the farms at L'Ange-Gardien were owned and under cultivation. Already, some of these farms had been divided and subdivided among heirs, as evidenced in the records.

Secondly, we must read into the documents. Charles was the third son of François and Marie Clément and the inventory of his father's estate was conducted six years after his death, more precisely on April 12, 1708 and two years later his mother Marie Clément sold to her son Pierre and to her underage children ... "nineteen perches wide of land Pierre must cultivate the land of the seller, keep her and her underage children..." This excluded Charles who was married and the father of five children.

Finally, it is almost certain that Charles had already left the homestead after his marriage to Louise Godin on August 27, 1705. Did he leave his hometown right after his marriage? It is quite possible.

Charles was not a cooper, like his father and brother, but was a sculptor. His home and studio situated on the shores of the St-Lawrence, close to the Church of St-François-de-Sales, at the very heart of the parish, was an ideal site and was accessible to Québec City and to many surrounding villages under development and expansion. Living at the centre of town, made travelling easy in order to fulfil the conditions of his contracts as his fame increased. Charles' sculptures, numerous and highly appraised, have survived the ravages of time and constitute now a significant part of our cultural heritage; to name a few: the frontal of the altar of Notre-Dame-de-la-pitié of Québec, the main altar of the Church of Sainte-Anne-du-Petit-Cap, that required two years' work to complete.


In 1731, his son Charles settled in Neuville on the "Chemin Royal",

on Lot No. 56. At Charles 11's death his widow inherited his assets that she in turn would leave to her two sons Augustin and Eustache. Their other son Alexandre settled on Lot No. 6.

Augustin's inheritance was passed on to his son Jean-Baptiste. Jean-Baptiste then purchased a portion of the Lot that his uncle Eustache had inherited from his mother; thus Lot No. 56 regained its original dimension.

Lot No. 56 was then in the hands of Jean-Baptiste who passed it on to his son Amédée who, in turn, passed it on to his son Isaïe Vézina. At his death Isaïe left his property on Lot No. 56 to his son Delphis, father of Philomène Vézina who left Neuville to come to Toronto at the turn of the Century. Her brother, Georges, who was then living in Toronto, suggested that she should come to Toronto. The couple Isaïe and Philomène were experiencing financial difficulties, their farm at Saint-Augustin of Portneuf, (now Saint-Augustin-de-Desmaures) had been bought by the Canadian National Railways. The land had been cut in half, rendering farming impossible and menacing the future of their children. Georges, Foreman at Gendron Manufacturing, insisted that he could give employment to their sons with this manufacturers of baby carriages, children's wagons, wheelchairs, ladders, briefly a variety of wood objects. Gendron employed many labourers and tradesmen, such as carpenters and wheelwrights the latter being in great demand as wheels were made of wood at the time.

NOTE: In 1920, Ida Vézina Rutherford, niece of Philomène, living in Toronto with her parents Joseph and Rosanna Belleville, at 14 Sumach, went back to Neuville to visit her uncles Delphée and Eustache. At the time the brothers lived in separate houses, next door to one another (although they "never spoke to each other"). The houses she visited were on the Chemin Royal (King's Road) across the road from the actual convent (where one of the Dionne Quints died). It is quite possible that this house was on Lot 56, passed on from father to son for two centuries.



CHAPTER 8

PILOTE\TREMBLAY MARRIAGES

In the seventeenth Century, the Québec population was made up of a few hundred families. A large number of these families had settled at Quebec City, L'Ile d'Orléans, on the Côte de Beaupré, that is to say on the shores of the St-Lawrence River and its tributaries, only means of communication for that era. The tract of lands were only a few "perches" (about a half acre) in width allowing the families to live within reach of one another.

This proximity provided mutual aid, protection against the elements and enemy attacks and helped neighbours to sustain the new settlers during their period of adjustment in a new land. They exchanged souvenirs and news of the country they had left. They assembled for celebrations, for planting in the Spring and reaping in the Fall. In fact, they became one big family. It is not surprising that the same families were affiliated by marriage many times over.

Like so many of their contemporaries, the descendants of Léonard Pilote were affiliated with the descendants of Pierre Tremblay - often referred to as "Father of a Nation". A quick look at the life of Pierre Tremblay and his ties with his contemporaries supports this "fame".

Pierre Tremblay had arrived at Québec on August 5, 1647 and ten years later had married the" Fille du Roy" Ozanne Achon on September 19, 1957. We know that Léonard Pilote was present at his marriage and that he and Pierre Tremblay had become good friends and met frequently and participated in many social and commercial activities. Consequently their children became good friends and came to play and love one another. It is, therefore, not surprising that the Tremblay\Pilote marriages multiplied through the generations and that the Pilotes contributed to the "Father of a Nation" fame. 


















































































































































































































































































































































































































































































































































































































































































































FAMILY NAMES WITH "dit"

Family names followed by "dit" appear frequently in registries. There are many possible reasons for this. Here are a few:

In certain cases, the mother's surname was retained. For example, a child born before a marriage took place (enfant naturel) and the name of one of the parent was not entered in the registry. Example: Jeanne Perron dit Suire was the child of Jean Perron and Jeanne Suire before the aforementioned were married. The child was registered Jeanne Suire, but after the marriage of her parents it was changed to Jeanne Perron dit Suire.

In other instances, the surname reflects the personality, the name of a regiment, the birthplace, the occupation, the trade. The following are examples: Bouchard le Petit (small) Claude, Langlois dit Boisverdun (birthplace).

Finally, the name following "dit" was used to identify or differenciate between cousins of the same name, a recurring situation for cousins with a common ancestor living in the same town. This is the case of "Audet dit Lapointe" (perhaps an "Audet" from "la pointe" (the point) of the Island or someone a little "pointu" (irritable). Throughout the centuries, members of a same family opted for one or the other of their surnames. "Audet dit Lapointe" is a case in point. A constant puzzle for genealogist
